

## Water Project Update

The water project is on schedule and moving along accordingly. The pumping and filtration building at the lake site is almost complete on the exterior. The water line work within the Village will start in mid-July. Please try to be patient while process occurs. There may temporary street closings and delays in traffic flow. The majority of the work will be concentrated on Warehouse Street, Warren Street and Bassett Street, however neighboring streets may be affected. We do not anticipate any interruptions in the water supply to the homes or businesses. If you do live within the work area, your driveway may not be accessible during the day. However, by the end of the work day your driveway will be accessible once again. We will send out a letter to those closely affected once work is to begin. 

It's possible to enjoy a sizzling-hot summer without getting burned! When the time comes to haul out the gas grill, camping equipment, and lawn mower, gives some thought to this advice. It'll keep you safer this summer:

**Grilling:** Keep barbecue grills far away from anything that can burn. Stay with the grill when lighted, and keep children and pets well away from the area. If you get burned, run cool water over the burn for 10 to 15minutes. (Tip: Don't use butter or a salve on burns because these seal in heat and can damage the tissue further.) If you receive a serious burn, with charred skin, for example, seek medical attention promptly.

**Fireworks:** The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend an outdoor public display put on by professionals. Every year, fireworks used by amateurs cause thousands of injuries serious enough to require emergency room treatment. Children between the ages of 10 and 14 are at greatest risk of injury from fireworks. Even sparklers are not considered safe entertainment. They burn as hot as 1200 degrees Fahrenheit and can result in serious injury.

**Boating:** Before fueling your boat, extinguish any smoking materials and shutdown all motors, fans, and heating devices. Be sure the fueling nozzle is grounded to the fuel intake and don't fill to capacity, leave room for expansion. Wipe up fuel spills immediately and check the bilge for fuel leakage and odors. Before starting the motor, ventilate with the blower for at least four minutes.

**Enjoying Your Pool:** Home pool care products that contain hydrogen chloride can spontaneously combust if contaminated by organic materials (i.e. body fluids, acid rain) or hydrocarbon liquids (i.e. fuel, motor oil). This type of fire will result in toxic fumes that can be extremely dangerous and require resident evacuation. Store and use pool chemicals according to the manufacturer's recommendations, in a dry place outside the home, away from any heat source or flame. Properly dispose of any punctured or damaged containers. Contact the Rushville Fire Dept for information on proper chemical storage.

Camping - Pitch your tent (flame retardant is best) well away from your campfire. Only use flashlights or battery-powered lanterns inside the tent or any other closed space, as opposed to liquid-fueled heaters or lanterns. In addition to the fire hazard posed by liquid-fueled devices, carbon monoxide poisoning can easily result in unvented spaces. Build your campfire downwind, away from your tent, clearing away all dry vegetation and digging a pit surrounded by rocks. Pour water over or cover the fire with dirt before going to sleep or leaving the campsite. Store liquid fire starter, NEVER use gasoline, away from your tent and campfire. Only use dry kindling to freshen a campfire, not liquid fuel.

By following these quick and simple steps, we can all keep summer activities fun and fire safe.
