Fall Leaf Pick Up







This month we will be starting our 9th season of fall leaf pick up. The start date for pick up is dependent upon the weather and when the leaves start to fall off of the trees. When a start date is determined, orange flyers will be placed around the Village indicating that leaf pick up has begun. Flyers will be posted at the following locations: the Village Office, Community Bank, Federal Hollow, The Lunch Box, Post Office, Reading Center, and Rushco. Once leaf pick up starts, we will generally pick up leaves once a week on Fridays, however this is not set in stone. We share the leaf vacuum with the Town of Gorham and work cooperatively with them throughout the season. For the most current information, please check the bulletin board outside the Village Office or call the Village Office for further details.

In order to make the process quick, easy, and beneficial for everyone, please be sure your leaves meet the following criteria:

- Leaves must be as close to the street as possible! We have limited reach with the vacuum hose.
- Leaves ONLY! No brush, walnuts, litter/garbage in the leaves.
- Do not bag the leaves! All bags will be emptied and it will be the homeowner's responsibility to dispose of the bags.

Fall fire Safety Tips by

Never park your car or truck over a pile of leaves. The heat from the vehicle's catalytic converter or exhaust system can ignite the leaves below. The resulting fire could destroy your vehicle. Flammable liguids should not be stored in inside the home or in an attached garage or shed. This includes any unused fuel still in the fuel tank. Store this equipment away from your home or drain excess fuel out of the tank before storing. This simple safety precaution will help prevent accidental fires from escaping fuel vapors. Remove fuel from lawn mowers before storing them for winter. Contact your utility company if trees or branches are not clear of power lines. Prune back trees, and rake up leaves and debris. If you live in an open area with a lot of natural vegetation, consider creating a defensible fire zone around your home. Prune the bottom branches from trees and remove shrubs and trees within 20 feet of your home. Don't store cardboard boxes, paper or other flammable materials in the backyard. These materials provide ready fuel for a fire and all it takes is one spark.

Spring forward, fall back, and check your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. When you change your clocks, also change the battery in your detectors. Developing this habit is a good way to remember a simple task that can save your life. Be sure there are working smoke detectors on each floor of your home, particularly outside of sleeping areas. Approximately 20 percent of detectors don't work because of dead or missing batteries. In addition to replacing smoke detector batteries twice a year, smoke detectors should be replaced every 10 years. Working smoke detectors will help you get out alive.

NOTE FROM CODE ENFORCEMENT

Just a reminder: No open burning is allowed in the Village such as leaves.

Also, house numbers need to be on the front of your house. These number should be 4" tall and each segment should be 1/2 " wide. This is a big help to emergency responders to locate your house.
